Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, and **Vermont**—possesses a unique way of life, and yet they're all connected by history, traditions, and a landscape so rich and varied that whether you come for a week or a month—or more—every day promises new discoveries. Adventurers will find great biking, hiking, and wildlife watching. Bargain hunters will find their own adventures in some of the best outlet stores in the country, in small towns as well as in New England's cities. What I hear so often from travelers is that there's simply no other destination where so many experiences for all ages await in such a small area.

And this magazine is just to get you started. Go to discovernewengland.org or discovernewengland.co.uk for expert advice and tips on how to get the most from your holiday. I quickly fell in love with these six unique states. Now it's your turn to "Discover New England." It will be good to have you here.



Whether soaring over a river or through the canopy, you'll be treated to stunning mountain vistas, for the ultimate leaf-peeping adventure and photos your friends won't believe. Add the treetop ropes courses, bridges, mountain coasters, and more on offer, and you'll create exciting memories that will last a lifetime. Burke Mountain Ski Area is a tuckedaway secret and National Geographic geotourism destination, with biking, kayaking, hiking, camping, and climbing when the snow melts. Lake Willoughby does a remarkable imitation of a Norwegian fjord; after your swim, hike up Mount Pisgah, where peregrine falcons nest. For indoor adventure, Jay Peak's massive indoor water park, the Pump House, offers plenty of surfing, climbing, and splashing.

By car, the 5.2-mile (8.3 km) Skyline Drive will string you along the crest of the mountain to the summit at 3,848 feet (1,173 m), with views of four states.

>> Day 1 Friday Afternoon & Evening: Eat in the North End & Walk to Faneuil Hall

Boston's North End is the most authentic "Little Italy" left in America—a web of narrow streets where pasta, gelato, and soccer jostle for dominance. Take a North End Market Tour for the scoop on biscotti, olive oil, and artisanal foods. Then treat yourself to osso buco at Mamma Maria's magical townhouse, tucked away in a tiny square across from the home of Revolutionary War hero Paul Revere, in one of the oldest neighborhoods in the country. After dinner, stroll down to the waterfront, or over to lively Faneuil Hall Marketplace. Built by Boston's wealthiest merchant in 1742, this bustling complex is chockablock with pretty shops, stalls, and a bit of circus atmosphere, thanks to street performers who gather daily on the cobblestones. George Washington raised a toast here to the nation's first birthday! Dining alternative: Union Oyster House, America's oldest continuously operating restaurant.

Boston's **Emerald Necklace** is a rare gem. Actually, it's a string of parks designed by Frederick Law Olmsted, culminating in the heart of the city at **Boston Common** (America's first public park, 1634) and the Public Garden (first public botanical garden, 1837). These two adjacent treasures are encircled by some of the most historic neighborhoods in the city, from brick-lined Beacon Hill to Chinatown to the Theater District. Polished Newbury Street shoots off to the west, lined with the chic (Chanel) and the sweet (Hotel Chocolat); pull up a ringside table at L'Aroma Café to watch the fashionistas on parade.









To the north, streets meander up Beacon Hill, an affluent world of cobblestones, streetlamps, and brownstones. Take a tea break at the **Ritz-Carlton**, on the other side of the Common; then duck back into the Garden for a Swan Boat ride, or go in search of the bronze ducklings depicting the characters in the beloved American children's classic Make Way for Ducklings, about a family of mallards who journey to the Public Garden. Look back on where you've been from the dining room at Troquet, with gorgeous views of Boston Common, and the Theater District at your feet.

11 Day 3

Sunday: Cambridge, Culture & More

Options in this museum-studded town are staggering, so keep it simple and pick a few that exploit the full range. (It's also your perfect excuse to become fluent in Boston's user-friendly transit system, the MBTA, a.k.a. "the T.") Start the morning in Cambridge, soaking up the vibe of Harvard Square with a flavorful brew at Tealuxe and a free tour of Harvard University. Then hop on the T to Boston's Fenway neighborhood and the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum; sample Gruyère quiche at **Café G**, in the company of Matisse and Whistler. Move on to relive the Camelot years at the John F. Kennedy Presidential Library & Museum, overlooking the sea, with its historic speeches, films, and memorabilia.

For a different waterfront experience, dive into the **New England Aquarium**'s four-story

Giant Ocean Tank, recently renovated and now home to some 2,000 creatures. Naturally, that's also where you can catch Boston's craziest ride: cruising the city on land and on the Charles River via a 65-minute Duck Tour in a replica World War II amphibious landing vehicle.

Or head back into the culture zone and spend some hours at the Museum of Fine Arts (MFA), the Museum of Science, or the Institute of Contemporary Art (ICA). End your day with dinner at Puritan & Company, for New England cuisine with a modern twist. Staying over? Spend a night on the water (Marriott Long Wharf), in an historic Back Bay luxury lodging place (The Lenox Hotel), or in the old Charles Street Jail (now the deluxe Liberty Hotel). Or try a pretty little B&B right on Newbury Street (Newbury Guest House).

The Gardner Museum, inspired by a Renaissance palazzo, houses a world-class collection of American, European, and Asian artworks, including paintings, sculptures, tapestries, silver, ceramics, mosaics, and rare books and manuscripts. The landscaped courtyard, below, reflects the founder's passion for formal garden design.



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CONNECTICUT

History, beauty, and idyllic small towns ...

Connecticut is the gateway to a fabled land of white-steepled churches, brilliant town greens, and sparkling-blue Atlantic waters, not to mention lively cities, great food, and some seriously competitive outlet shopping. From the expanse of beaches that unfurl along Long Island Sound to the brainy bustle of Yale University and New Haven to the whaling history of Mystic Seaport, the state is an unmatched blend of sophistication, as well as the charm inherent in historic towns and villages nestled into rolling hills that were first settled in the 1600s.

5 MEMORABLE DAYS IN CONNECTICUT

)) Long Island Sound

SEE: Picturesque villages dot the Connecticut edge of the Sound, like pearls scattered on sand. Explore them all, walking the beaches along the way. From **Guilford**, where the massive town green is ringed by tantalizing shops. head east to dip your toes in the sea at Madison, with more than two miles (3.2 km) of sandy beach at Hammonasset State Park.



SHOP: It's serious bargain hunting at the 70 stores of Clinton Crossing Premium Outlets. with deep discounts on Calvin Klein, Kate Spade, and scores of other designers. **EAT:** The acclaimed Sunday brunch at the Water's Edge Resort **G** Spa in Westbrook will let you explore for days without refueling. SLEEP: Saybrook



But if you're smart, you'll investigate the **Beinecke Rare** Book & Manuscript **Library**, a gleaming rectangle of translucent marble housing a Gutenberg Bible. Stroll to the Yale museums

and galleries, with their ancient and modern treasures. Just 11 miles (17.7 km) away, in **Stony Creek**, Captain Bob Milne's sunset boat tour threads its way through the magical Thimble Islands. SHOP: Chapel Street hums with artisanal jewelry and fashions, plus restaurants from Thai to Turkish. **EAT:** At Frank Pepe's



)) Along the **Connecticut River SEE:** New England's longest river—407 miles (655 km) snakes through terrain of every kind. Climb aboard for a nostalgic 12-mile (19.3 km) ride on the vintage Essex Steam **Train** through an unspoiled river valley named "one of the last great places on earth" by The Nature Conservancy. The train drops you at the **Becky** *Thatcher* riverboat for a cruise, where you'll glimpse the imposing Goodspeed Opera House, as well as Gillette Castle, a crazy, Gaudí-like confection perched like a

bird on a cliff.

Bundle up and look to the skies! From January through March, bald eagles flee Canada and head to the lower Connecticut River, where you can take an **Eaglewatch Boat** Tour in Essex for a two-hour guided cruise.

)) Litchfield Hills

SEE: The name is like a cool breeze, and that's the feeling as you meander rolling hills. Fall foliage is gorgeous here, and there's a reason so many celebrities call this region home: picture-postcard villages, covered bridges, and classic town greens. Stately mansions characterize Litchfield; Norfolk and Wash**ington** whisk you back in time to village life 200 years ago; and lovely Kent, named number 1 for foliage by Yankee Magazine, is lined with boutiques and galleries. The Housatonic River begs you to rent a kayak, or take a walk along a 5-mile (8 km) stretch of the Appalachian Trail.

SHOP: Woodbury wears the mantle of New England's antiques capital, with more than 30 dealers in a town of fewer than 10,000 residents.

EAT: On Litchfield's town green, the **West** Street Grill is both a local landmark and a perennial state favorite.

SLEEP: Bask in 5-star luxury at the Mayflower Inn & Spa in Washington, lauded by National Geographic Traveler.

>> Hartford & Environs

SEE: Tour the historic Mark Twain House. where the beloved author wrote Adventures of Huckleberry Finn. Harriet Beecher **Stowe**, of UncleTom's Cabin fame, lived next door in an elegant Victorian; park once to visit both. The Wadsworth Atheneum is America's oldest public art museum. And few spectacles can match **Elizabeth** Park Conservancy's vast public rose garden, oldest in the country. SHOP: West Hartford Center and Blue Back

Sacred to New England's native peoples, Mount Kineo is marked by a distinctive cliff face, which rises 700 feet (213.36 m) above the waters of Moosehead Lake, in west-central Maine. Access is by boat; a shuttle from Rockwood can take you across during the summer months. Hiking trails lead to the summit, where views from the fire tower are spectacular. Or book an airborne adventure: The Birches Resort will take you up in a seaplane for an aerial tour of the region. For more on the Moosehead area, see p. 32.

Pounding wayes and a rocky coastline spiked with lighthouses ... In Maine, you'll live by the rhythm of the tides, winding through fishing villages past sea captains' homes, eating shellfish on the rocks. This rugged fortress of a state looks out over the Atlantic like a proud figurehead on a ship from days gone by. Lobstermen still prowl Maine's waterways, but today's coastal villages are also havens of culture and cuisine. Portland's food scene is legendary. and towns such as Kennebunkport and Rockport are synonymous with presidents, artists, and craftsmen. Inland villages have their own sturdy beauty, and centrally, Mount Katahdin rises to a mighty peak in Baxter State Park, a spectacular gift of more than 327 square miles (847 square kilometers) from a former governor. No one knows the wilderness like the legendary

Maine Guides, who'll take you fishing, kayaking, or whitewater rafting (or maybe even help you spot a moose), upholding a century-old tradition. Another tradition—outlet shopping in

places like Kittery and Freeport, home

SEE: Brick-lined Exchange Street is Old Port's quaint thoroughfare, with designer clothing. cafés, and Mainemade goods. Follow the street down to the waterfront for a handcrafted pastry at Standard Baking Company before hopping aboard the

Casco Bay Ferry to Peaks Island, for a serene afternoon bike ride on a bitesize island with inescapable water views. For an artful interpretation of it all, don't miss the **Portland Museum** of Art's Winslow Homer and Andrew Wyeth paintings. SHOP: Old Port teems with boutiques and galleries set on cobblestone

streets or in restored warehouses, with specialty shops for cooks, dog lovers, and knitters, plus locally crafted treasures, such as tourmaline jewelry made from exquisite Maine gems, or breezy **Sea Bags** made from vintage sails. Ten minutes away, the state's largest shopping center, The Maine Mall, offers 140 stores and restaurants.

With 230 restaurants to choose from in a city known for cutting-edge cuisine, start with the muchpraised Fore Street or DiMillo's on the Water (a converted car ferry surrounded by water), or try

With 73 square miles (189 square kilometers) to explore, get your bearings with a 2.5-hour tour on Oli's Trolley out of **Bar Harbor**, the island's largest town (one of four), with

a stop on **Cadillac**

Mountain. Or cruise Frenchman Bay aboard a majestic schooner leaving from the **Bar Harbor** Inn's pier. )) Moosehead Lake

SEE: The name says it all: a region so unspoiled that Maine's most fascinating residents—moose—feel completely at home. At the gateway to the Great North Woods, spectacular Moosehead Lake is an ideal backdrop for hiking, sailing, whitewater rafting, and, of course, moose spotting. A threehour journey on the National Historic Landmark steamboat Katahdin, built in 1914, brings you to the water's widest point, with breathtaking mountain views and a glimpse of the state's highest peak in the distance.

Or sign up for a moose tour with Northwoods Outfitters, who'll take you on a wildlife safari by land or water. **SHOP:** Your inner adventurer can stock up in Greenville at **Indian Hill** Trading Post, a 35,000-square-foot (3,251.6 sqm) emporium packed with summer sandals, fly rods, tents, cast-iron beanpots, Carhartt jackets, bakery goods, and deli treats. EAT: Rugged countryside calls for five-course eating, and the **Blair Hill Inn** serves locally sourced dinners set high above the lake, with commanding views. **SLEEP:** The elegant Greenville Inn is an award-winning





Timeless beauty, where history and the future come together ...





From coastal Cape Cod, its beauty sculpted by the Atlantic, to the lively Berkshire arts scene in the west, Massachusetts weaves a story of New England. Contemporary style mixes with history in settings that move from endless beaches to rolling hills. Multicultural Boston, a waterfront mecca whose cobblestone streets are lined with sleek boutiques, is where Revolutionary War hero Paul Revere lived and President John F. Kennedy was born (see "The Perfect Boston Weekend," p. 20). The Pilgrims landed in Provincetown, where today's mix of history and hipness is astounding. Nantucket and Martha's Vineyard islands entice visitors to shop, explore golden beaches, and learn about whaling history. Meanwhile, Great Barrington boasts culinary greatness; world-class cultural institutions turn up everywhere; and places like the Pioneer Valley and Berkshire County offer interesting and eclectic college towns in Amherst, Northampton, and Williamstown—hotbeds of vibrant energy. Grounded in history, propelled by restless curiosity, Massachusetts rewards its visitors with fresh surprises.

5 MEMORABLE DAYS IN MASSACHUSETTS

>> Culture in the **Berkshire Hills**

SEE: European and American paintings, sculptures, and more (the French Impressionists are a special focus) are at home at the world-class Sterling & Francine Clark Art Institute currently undergoing a multimilliondollar expansion, in Williamstown. And for modern-art aficionados, the Massachusetts

Museum of Contemporary Art (MASS MoCA) offers expansive exhibitions just a few miles east, in North Adams. For outdoor inspiration, hike (or drive) to the summit of Mount **Greylock**, the state's highest peak. **SHOP:** Steeped in a creative climate. **Stockbridge** has its share of unique shops and art galleries, but its popular **Norman Rockwell Museum** houses the world's largest collection by America's favorite

illustrator, plus a gift shop that captures it all. **EAT:** Talented chefs have invaded Great Barrington, making it one of the top food destinations in New England, with Japanese (Bizen Kaiseki), Mediterranean (Naji's), and gourmet applecider treats (Home Sweet Home Doughnut Shoppe). **SLEEP:** The **Red Lion** Inn, a Stockbridge gem with a cozy pub serving homemade



South Shore & Cape Cod

SEE: Heading south from Boston along the coast, in **Plymouth** you'll step into the world of Pilgrims and Wampanoags, as interpreters reenact colonial life at Plimoth Plantation. For insight into the Pilgrims' journey,

climb aboard the Mayflower II, the newly refurbished replica of the ship that brought them to the New World. Farther south, on the western shore of Buzzards Bay, New Bedford represents the heart of American whaling history on the mainland. Seafarers from Portugal and its colonies (including Cape Verde, the Azores, and Madeira) were drawn to these shores in large numbers, and that heritage is still visible today in the

city's many Iberian restaurants and cultural events. Don't miss the outstanding exhibits and artifacts at the **New Bedford** Whaling Museum and the other sites that make up **New** Bedford Whaling National Historical Park. Moving east, crimson colors flood the South Shore and Cape Cod in the fall as cranberries ripen in their bogs; you can take a guided tour of a working operation with **Cape Farm Supply and Cranberry** Company in Harwich. Then head north for a taste of another type of rare natural beauty, as the Cape Cod **National Seashore** stretches 40 miles (64.3 km) along the Atlantic until it curls around Provincetown, with sweeping beaches, lighthouses, and ocean vistas.

Art's Dune Tours leads hair-raising rides through the sandy expanse, and you'll have a bird's-eye view from the Pilgrim Monument (commemorating the Pilgrims' first landing before sailing on to establish their colony at Plymouth). The sun sets at romantic Race Point Beach. **SHOP:** For history books and 17thcentury-style reproduction handcrafts, visit the Plimoth **Plantation Museum Shop**. At land's end, **Provincetown** has more art galleries, shops, pretty inns, and cafés than seashells on the shore. **EAT:** In New Bedford, try Antonio's for authentic Portuguese fare. On Cape Cod, save your appetite for The Black Cat Tavern's massive lobster roll, with

views of the harbor at Hyannis. Hidden on a lane overgrown with sunflowers and roses, Napi's is a Provincetown landmark offering Mediterranean and Brazilian cuisine, and décor inspired by years of collecting. **SLEEP:** In New Bedford, Melville House (where Moby-Dick author Herman Melville was a frequent quest in his sister's home) offers tasteful rooms in an historic setting. Accommodations are raised to an art form in Provincetown; see the listings at ptownchamber .com/stay/bed-andbreakfast-guest*houses-inns*. There's camping and a hostel, too: **ptownchamber** .com/stay/ campsites-hostels

)) Island Hopping **SEE:** Like a pearl tossed off the coast, Martha's Vineyard, once home to sea captains, now plays summer host to high-profile vacationers such as the Obamas and the Clintons. Start your day at Oak Bluffs Harbor, with its colorful settlement of 180 gingerbread cottages. Then explore **Gay** Head Lighthouse, perched on the dramatic **Aquinnah Cliffs**. Farther flung than its sister island, **Nantucket** is defined by its whaling heritage. Rent a bike to cycle to magical 'Sconset, a vision in rose-covered cottages, or visit the giant skeleton at the **Nantucket** Whaling Museum. SHOP: On "the Vineyard," **Edgartown**'s breezy streets and nautical shops offer tempting vacation strolls. On Nantucket, you'll want to navigate the harbor


streets and duck into brick shops to scoop up scrimshaw or some "Nantucket Red" clothing at Murray's Toggery. **EAT:** Edgartown, on Martha's Vineyard, is the scene for a lovely waterfront lunch at Among the Flowers Café. On Nantucket, locals line up for sourdough French toast at **Black-Eyed** Susan's; sophisticated **CRU** serves fresh seafood on Straight Wharf, where open windows catch the fragrant island breezes. **SLEEP:** Come nightfall, there are more than 100 places on the Vineyard to rest your head, so there's loads of time to birdwatch, find a beach, or check out local handcrafts. Find just the right place at *mvy.com*. Each lovely inn on Nantucket seems lifted from the pages of a history book, whether it's the elegant Jared **Coffin House** or the ultra-luxe Wauwinet.



>> Portsmouth & Vicinity

see: An historic seaport since the 1600s. today Portsmouth's downtown teems with lively shops and cafés. A quick walk

takes you to **Prescott** Park, where summer concerts play on the waterfront, or to Strawbery Banke a 10-acre (4 ha or 40,468.5 sqm) outdoor museum of historic homes. Take a midday sail on the Gundalow **Piscatagua** and help

the crew haul lobster, or take a harbor cruise offered by the Isles of Shoals Steamship Company.

SHOP: Surrender yourself to the seaside promenade experience of Hampton Beach, a kid-friendly extravaganza of arcades, mini-golf, and souvenir shops across the boulevard from the state park.



)) Hanover & Vicinity

SEE: Dartmouth College is one of America's great universities, and the town of Hanover lives up to its school's reputation. Spend the morning immersed in the **Hood Museum** of Art collection; then treat yourself to an afternoon at the home, studio, and gardens of Augustus Saint-Gaudens, one of America's most famous sculptors, in nearby Cornish. The 1866 Cornish-Windsor Bridge is another work of art: the longest vintage two-span wooden covered bridge in the U.S., still carrying

SHOP: Stroll the Dartmouth Green: then head to South Main Street, where bookstores vie with Dartmouth sportswear and specialty boutiques. **EAT:** A feast for the eyes and palate, the 1818 Home Hill Inn in nearby Plainfield serves food from local farms and vegetables and herbs from its own gardens. 

And, by the way, most of it isn't even an island. What's indisputable, however, is that Rhode Island's beaches are brilliant. Waterfront dining is as plentiful as the surfers bobbing in Narragansett Bay, not to mention the many elegant inns on the water and off. Seaside villages such as Watch Hill are among the prettiest you'll see anywhere. And the splendor of the Newport Mansions suggests Downton Abbey but with an ocean view. Palatial homes, cliff walks, the amazing spectacle of WaterFire in Providence, kayaking around Block Island, shopping in classic villages ... Expect endless enticements from this tiny state.

5 MEMORABLE DAYS IN RHODE ISLAND

SEE: Wealthy indus-

Newport

trialists were America's royalty, and Newport was their playground in the 19th century. Astors and Vanderbilts competed to see who could throw more crystal, gold, and Italian marble at their mansions, in a blazing display of finery; touring these "cottages," maintained by the **Preservation Society** of Newport County, brings the Gilded Age to vivid life. Equally impressive:

combines natural beauty with views of the massive homes. **SHOP:** Busy **Thames** Street (pronounce the "th"!) hums with activity, and more than 50 shops are scattered around the wharves, with items from

estate jewelry to Asian tableware. EAT: At day's end, enjoy a lobster bake and sunset sail on the Schooner Aurora. **SLEEP:** Newport is brimming with upscale lodgings and lovely inns. Railroad baron and sportsman Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt's 1909 **Newport mansion** has been converted to the Vanderbilt Grace. a luxury hotel with 33 rooms and a spa.

)) Providence

SEE: One of the oldest cities in the U.S.,

this compact capital is set, like Rome, on seven hills. Its wealthy past reveals itself with a morning walk along historic Benefit Street, past Federal-era homes. Then feast your eves on the **Rhode** Island School of Design's museum collection, including Paul Revere's silver and paintings from Monet to Rothko. In season, the spectacle of WaterFire sets the city's three rivers ablaze with 100 floating bonfires. **SHOP:** Providence Place Mall puts you

Fall Spectacular Autumn colors aren't the only things blazing at Providence's Roger Williams Park Zoo, a 40-acre (16 ha or 161,874 sqm) expanse that's one of the oldest (1872) zoos in the country. Its Jack-O-Lantern Spectacular features 5,000 illuminated pumpkins carved into works of art.

squarely in the center of the city with more than 1 million square feet (92,903 sqm) of shops, cinemas, restaurants, and an adjoining hotel. **EAT:** Climb **Federal Hill** to "Little Italy." where pasta reigns supreme (although you'll never go hungry in a city that's home to one of the great culinary schools, **Johnson** & Wales University). **SLEEP:** Just a twominute walk to WaterFire, rooms at the **Renaissance** Providence Downtown Hotel look out

Wickford Village is close to perfection, arranged around a sparkling harbor, with kayaks for rent at The Kayak Centre.

to the classic State House and city lights.

)) South County **SEE:** Beaches unfurl from Watch Hill to Point Judith, with sugary white sand and dreamy names like "Blue Shutters." Start your day in Watch Hill, with a view of Block Island Sound from your breakfast nook on the Ocean House hotel's elegant porch. This charming town offers upscale shopping and one of the oldest carousels in the country, but its hidden treasure is Napatree Point Conservation Area one of the most beautiful, least crowded beaches in the state. Then head to Narragansett to check out the surfers, sampling hidden beaches, such as **Ninigret Park**, as you go.

SHOP: In Charlestown, the **Fantastic** Umbrella Factory is an explosion of wind chimes, stained glass, Indian scarves, vintage eyewear, and a zillion other treasures not to be missed. EAT: In Rhode Island. "stuffies" are as iconic as crumpets—except that these little cakes feature quahogs (huge clams). The fresh shellfish is chopped and mixed with breadcrumbs, onions, celery, garlic, or whatever the chef envisions, and there's no more famous place to try them than George's of Galilee, in a little fishing village on **Salty Brine** State Beach. **SLEEP:** Tucked away on a quiet street in Westerly, the Shelter **Harbor Inn** has private access to a stunning stretch of sand on Weeka-

paug Beach.


)) Block Island

SEE: The island is an unspoiled gem, with 17 miles (27.4 km) of pristine beaches. Catch the ferry from **Point Judith** year-round, or from Newport in the summer; then rent a bike and spin out of town on an undulating loop with plenty of detours. Frolic on Mansion Beach, where tidal pools and passing ferries make a perfect backdrop to a fresh basket of clam strips. Or picnic at the 19th-century South East Lighthouse atop Mohegan Bluffs, spectacular 150-foot-high (47.7 m) cliffs that gaze out to sea—a great destination if you're horseback riding or parasailing, as well. **SHOP:** Water Street, the island's main



You'll find no televisions in its 21 questrooms just water views and sea breezes.


)) Little Compton **SEE:** With water everywhere, Little Compton always tops the list of prettiest places in

New England. The village is surrounded by saltwater farms, farm stands, and orchards, and is anchored by one of the few town greens in Rhode Island. A handful of houses remain from the 1600s, with plenty from the 18th and 19th centuries, too. Tour **Sakonnet** Vineyards, sunbathe at Goosewing **Beach**, or simply drive the idyllic country roads. **SHOP:** Don't miss old-fashioned C. W. Wilbur General Store, which stocks everything from fresh meats to fine gifts and toys.

EAT: Commons **Lunch** is famed for its home-style cooking and cornmeal "iohnnycakes." a regional specialty. **SLEEP:** At **Harmony** Home Farm. breakfast is served on a tray in your bedroom, with scones that may rival the best you've ever tasted, showcasing why New England bed-and-breakfasts are unique in the world. It all comes with the scent of the sea.



>> Burlington

SEE: Rarely does a small city offer so many diversions. With glistening Lake Champlain at its feet, a lively pedestrians-only downtown in the middle, and the University of Vermont at the top of the hill, Burlington is a classic overachiever: it does it all, and we reap the benefits, in all seasons. Rent a bike to pedal the 7½-mile (12 km) path hugging the massive lake, with beaches along the way. Then head to Church Street and snag a ringside seat at any outdoor café to watch the street performers outdo one another.



only Church Street feels like a permanent street festival, and it's a shopper's mecca with artisans (Frog Hollow on the Marketplace), boutiques (Monelle, Salaam), brand names (Banana Republic), and **Burlington Town Center Mall** retailers such as Pottery Barn and J. Crew. **EAT:** Take your pick along Church Street—Italian, Asian, Irish, Mexican—but make time to sit outside at Leunig's Bistro, a little piece of Paris with the best peoplewatching in town. Nearby, **Dobrá Tea** is a Bohemian tearoom, serving more than 90 imported varieties. **SLEEP:** Burlington's newest nest—Hotel Vermont—manages the same mellow balance as the city itself, shifting between natural and sophisticated, with the emphasis firmly on Vermont-made comforts, such as woollen blankets. For views of Lake Champlain, and the Adirondack Mountains that blaze in

the fall, book a room at the Marriott's Courtyard Burlington Harbor.

)) Stowe & **Mount Mansfield**

see: With Mount Mansfield rising above, you're standing at the base of Vermont's highest point: 4,393 feet (1,339 m) of mountain teeming with trails and outdoor adventure. (On a clear day, you can see New York State's Adirondacks and Canada.) Bike the 5-mile (8 km) **Stowe** Bike Path, which crosses the **West** Branch River 11 times on arched bridges. Or drive on toward Smugglers' Notch **State Park** and some of the most dramatic views in the state. **SHOP:** With more than 70 shops, plus museums and galleries, you can soak up sophisticated Stowe

while eyeing works at the **Vermont Fine Art Gallery**, cool stuff at Lackey's Variety **Store**. needlework supplies at **Wooden** Needle, and everything else at **Stowe** Mercantile, a genuine country store. **EAT:** On the mountain, there's country chic, such as the **Cliff House Restaurant**, serving artisanal cuisine with rustic flavor. In the village, **Blue Moon Café** offers Asian and Mediterranean cuisine. Save room for the **Ben** & **Jerry's** ice cream factory tour in nearby **Waterbury**, or browse the **Cabot** Annex Store for awardwinning cheeses and Vermont crafts. **SLEEP:** The hills are alive with the sound of happy quests at Trapp Family Lodge, an Austrian-inspired icon that has graced the Stowe landscape for more than half a

century, now home to a brewery and mountain biking, as well as a world-class resort featuring four seasons of outdoor activities

)) Manchester

see: With its stunning landscape, Manchester, in southern Vermont. has attracted visitors for centuries, including its most famous name: Lincoln. Abraham Lincoln's eldest son, Robert, built a summer home, **Hildene**, here. This 24-room Georgian Revival house museum gives you an intimate glimpse into the Lincoln family history, all surrounded by walking trails. **SHOP:** Ringed by mountains, the village spills over with some of the most diverse local stores and outlet

shopping in the state, from **Orvis** for outdoor sportsmen, to Northshire Book**store**. with an entire floor devoted to children's literature, to designer outlets offering discounted prices on Armani, Brooks Brothers, Coach, and more. **EAT:** Sit outside at **Seasons** or make a date with history at **The Dorset Inn** (15 minutes away), Vermont's oldest continuously operating hostelry, established in 1796 and still serving innovative gourmet meals. **SLEEP:** First Lady Mary Lincoln slept at the stately fourdiamond **Equinox Resort**, and you can, too. Golf, archery, a fly-fishing school. and a lesson with the British School of Falconry are all options

)) Woodstock & Vicinity

to the Lincolns.

SEE: Ambling past Woodstock's town green and landmark inn toward its busy shopping streets is like being dropped into a movie about idyllic Vermont life. The dream continues at Billings Farm & Museum, the Rockefellers' working dairy farm and 1890 farmhouse, where you'll glimpse Vermont's rural past. Stop at Sugarbush Farm to

Even some of the locals in bustling Burlington are unaware of the Champlain Islands, just 20 minutes away. Little pearls scattered on the water: drive or bike them all, including North and South Hero, Grand Isle, and magical Isle La Motte.

sample cheese and learn about maple syrup, or drive to Quechee Gorge to sunbathe on river rocks. **SHOP:** Don't miss **F. H.** Gillingham & Sons an emporium of garden tools, housewares, sporting goods, and Vermont goodies. Then head over to Ouechee and the Simon Pearce store to marvel at exquisite

Winter Wonderland Jay Peak Resort, near the Canadian border, offers plenty of diversions even if you're not a skier: one of the largest indoor water parks in the East, plus an indoor ice arena, pools, spas, and a championship golf course. If you do ski, 77 trails and the most snow and glades in eastern North America are part of the legend.

surveys the town from center stage, with airy rooms, a spa, and a tavern that invites late-night drinks.

)) Inn to Inn

SEE: Traveling on foot brings you face to face with rolling green fields, peaceful roads, hillside farms, and village shopping nooks. Vermont Inn to Inn Walking Tours links four lodgings in Weston, Chester, and Ludlow, three of the prettiest towns in Vermont, with walks that include village shops and vistas out of Norman Rockwell. Your bags are packed and sent on ahead—just walk to your next homecooked meal. **SHOP:** Dip into Weston's Vermont Country Store, spilling over with wooden bowls,

rubber boots, and

enough cheese, fudge, crackers, and jam samples to fortify you for the walk ahead. The Weston **Priory Gift Shop** sells handcrafts and music created by the Benedictine brothers. as well as goods from around the world. EAT: Each night you'll sample innkeeper specialties, but the unexpected surprise is Michiko Yoshida-Hunter, a world-class Japanese chef and co-owner of Old Town Farm Inn's ToKai-Tei restaurant. **SLEEP:** Your choice: Combes Family Inn, Apple Knoll Inn, Inn Victoria, or Old Town Farm Inn. 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
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
